THE 2012 ENERGY AUDIT RESULTS ARE IN, with the average annual energy use per household coming in at **15,434kWh** – up 2,544kWh on 2011's figures. The increase is partly due to 2012 having a particularly cold start and a pretty awful summer, which meant we all used more heating and more hot water. But the good news is this figure is still **significantly under the UK average**, which Ofgem says is around 19,800kWh. So, how much energy does your household use? If you don't already know, why not sign up to our online Energy Audit and see how you compare with our local average. COMMUNITY ENHANCEMENT – The Litter Pickers' smart new signs will be in evidence next month on roadside verges following litter picks, thanks to **Timbercraft's Adrian Stahl**. Adrian generously made and donated 18 sturdy stakes for the signs, saying it was his bit towards the community effort. 1st **Crickhowell and Llangattock Scout Group** have also been doing their bit, joining the Litter Pickers for a sweep of the common land below the Beaufort road, from the cattle grid to the B4560 junction on Saturday 2 February. Heavy snow in January meant cancelling the Thursday 24th pick, but over the whole month the team collected 13 bags and put in an impressive 27.5 volunteer hours. RESIDENTIAL – The **thermal imaging camera** has been doing the rounds and the good news is that the homes we've visited are all pretty well insulated and draughtproofed, so on the whole, a reassuring result. Oh – and the answer to last month's conundrum: what were the bright yellow blobs on Simon's image? Sparrows! This face of Simon's house is slated and it seems the birds spend the night tucked up behind the slates.

Meanwhile, if you're thinking about **solar PV**, there's never been a better time to take the plunge. Based on the current 15.44p Feed-In Tariff and the latest panel prices available through Reach For The Renewables, our group-buying club, you can expect **excellent returns of up to 13.9%** for 20 years (based on our standard 4kWp/16-panel domestic scheme).

PLUS we now offer **IntellyPower** – a nifty piece of kit designed to maximise the benefits of solar PV by automatically directing any surplus electricity to heat your hot water. COMMUNITY BUILDINGS – Some good results here: the Community Hall continues to reap the benefits of the **air source heat pump** installed through Green Streets. In 2012 the hall used just 4,373kWh of energy for heating, which works out at **less than £500** for the year. In addition, the school and community hall reported a combined **12% reduction in electricity consumption**. And thanks to the school's new boiler and heating system, they cut their year- on-year gas consumption by a whopping **27%**. Plus the school's PV system continues to provide them with free renewable electricity and bring in a nice little income, with Feed In Tariff earnings now totalling **£3,500** since January 2011.

WOODLANDS – The **felling season** is in full swing, with volunteers busy at both the Dan y Graig and Ty Mawr woodlands. Meanwhile, down on Canalside, the group has built an **otter holt**, using logs and brash so it blends in seamlessly. Otters have been seen in the area and otter spraint has been found on the towpath, so the volunteers are hoping the cosy holt will get some use. The group also has a new volunteer: James joined the group after completing a month on a Manadatory Work Activity scheme; he's made a big contribution already and is eager to get involved in all the group's projects. MICRO-ENERGY GENERATION – Good news here, with the feasibility study for **Nant-y-Hafod** showing that a 13kW scheme is possible. We will begin the process of placing the scheme into the design and planning/permission stage in the coming weeks. Plus we've secured funding from the Brecon Beacons National Park Authority's Sustainable Development Fund to help carry out feasibility studies on **12 potential new micro-hydro schemes** in the region, with six to be completed before 31 March and six before the end of April, with the hope that a significant number will prove to be viable.

COMMUNITY-SCALE ENERGY GENERATION – A big month for us and our partners The Glanusk Estate, as it's **decision time** on whether we proceed to the working up stage for the anaerobic digestion facility. This stage will take several hundred thousand pounds to mature, so we need to be confident that we have a bankable scheme.
