ALLOTMENTS (LACAS) – The Allotments are going cultural this month with a special open-air performance on **26 July, from 6:30pm**. *Run Jack Run* is a storytelling show with live music and projected visuals by The Magical Illuminarium. Perfect for families, the show tells two intertwining stories from the Welsh woods and the Lancashire hills and is part of the Arts Council of Wales' excellent *Night Out* scheme, which helps bring theatre and music to rural communities. Plus, don't forget – the annual LACAS Summer Show is all set for Saturday 14 September.

COMMUNITY ENHANCEMENT – The wooden troughs bought and planted up for the community by Llangattock Litter Pickers are looking lovely as they head towards glorious full bloom, with a total of five



planters now bringing a welcome splash of colour. Meanwhile, the group has had a busy June, with seven volunteers contributing a total of 31.8 hours to help keep our community looking great. Together they covered 159.4 miles of road and canalside verges to

collect 15.25 bags of litter, over 84% of which was sent for recycling. **Next litter picks:** Thursday **18 July** and Saturday **3 August**, meeting at 9:30am by the playing fields entrance on Park Drive.

COMMUNITY BUILDINGS – Llangattock Primary School's solar PV panels continue to perform above expectation, netting a welcome **£874.08** for the school (plus free electricity), for the six months to 1 July. British Gas reckons the panels are producing **9% more electricity** than predicted – a great result.

WOODLANDS – The woodland group has teamed up with Rachel Palmer of Keep Wales Tidy for a pioneering project looking at the importance of hedgerows in our native landscape. Volunteers from the group helped Rachel carry out the very first '**Long Forest**' survey on 18 June and, as a result, Rachel was able to make some simple but important changes to the questionnaire to ensure it records all the information needed for this vital research project.

The group is also working closely with The Green Valleys and Dr Jane Sedgeley of the Vincent Wildlife Trust on the '**Our Beacon for Bats' project**. Anabat detectors will be going into the Ty Mawr woodland to help identify the species present and the level of activity in the woodland, and there are plans for a bat recording evening at Canalside later this month.

And finally, creatures of a different kind have been making an appearance in the group's woodlands. This cute little wooden deer *(right)* is the first to emerge from the group's new **craft enterprise**, and as you can see, he's perfectly at home in a woodland or garden setting. The group is currently busy making more, with plans to sell them locally and at the Royal Welsh Show later this month to raise money for tools and equipment. So, how much do you think he's worth? MICRO-ENERGY GENERATION

LGV Ventures has instructed our partners TGV Hydro to **progress three of our Phase 2 microhydro schemes to the pre-application stage**, which sees dialogue beginning with Natural



Resources Wales (formally the Environment Agency). Landowner discussions are underway concerning a number of other Phase 2 schemes and we are hoping to be able to progress some of these as well. In addition, we have begun regular monitoring to record the water flow on two of our Phase 1 schemes and six other streams over the summer months. This will enable us to compare the actual flows with the forecast flows.

PLUS we've started preparing a **share offer scheme** through our partners Sharenergy, aimed at raising funds to cover the construction of our three Phase 1 micro-hydro schemes. The share offer will be open to all and more details will be announced over the coming weeks.
